




	Learning Objective	Suggested Activities
Literacy 	<p>To talk about fireworks, the sounds they make and how they look.</p> <p>To listen to sounds in words and record the sounds they hear.</p>	<p>Click on the link to watch a video of fireworks. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=OE4haJHYUJw</p> <p>What can you see? What do the fireworks look like? What colours are they? What can you hear? What sort of noises do they make?</p> <p>Can you draw a picture of the fireworks and write some of the words that you thought of? E.G. bang, sparkle. Listen for the sounds in the words and record the sounds your hear.</p>

Maths 	<p>To be able to count groups to 10. To be able to combine two groups to make an amount to 10.</p>	<p>Can you draw two groups of fireworks. E.g. 3 in blue and 4 in red. How many is in each group? How many are there altogether? Can you write the addition sentence for that picture? E.g. $3 + 4 = 7$</p> <p>Can you write a part part whole for your picture too? E.g. This is where you write the two parts in the little circles and the Whole number in the one big circle.</p> <p>Can someone draw you a picture of some fireworks and you write the addition sum and part part whole for their picture?</p> <div style="text-align: right;">  </div>

<p>Physical Development</p> 	<p>To be able to make a firework dance, moving in different ways.</p>	<p>https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/b03g6tsp</p> <p>Listen to The BBC school radio clip that helps you create your own shooting star dance. You'll move just like a firework!!</p>
<p>Communication and Language</p>	<p>To make firework biscuits.</p>	<p>Can you make your own firework biscuits. Follow the instructions:</p> <p>Ingredients 250g (2 cups) plain flour 150g (1 stick) butter, softened 100g (1/2 cup) caster sugar 1 egg $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla extract</p> <p>HOW TO MAKE FIREWORK BISCUITS Preheat the oven to 180C / 160C Fan / gas 4 / 350F and line a baking tray with baking/parchment paper.</p> <p>RUB THE FLOUR AND BUTTER TOGETHER Get your kids to measure the flour and butter out add to a large mixing bowl. Using your fingers rub it together until it looks like breadcrumbs. This is one of my kid's favourite things to do in the kitchen but it can get a bit messy if you're not careful!</p> <p>ADD THE SUGAR, EGG AND VANILLA</p>

		<p>Measure the sugar out and add to your flour/butter mixture. Add the egg and vanilla extract. If your kids are in charge of the egg, I normally find it safer to crack it into a small bowl first, before adding it to your dough in case you end up with rogue shell.</p> <p>Knead or mix everything together until it is well combined into a nice soft dough.</p> <p>MAKE THE FIREWORK BISCUITS</p> <p>Sprinkle a little flour down on your work surface and roll the dough out so it is about 5mm thick. Using a star cutting cut the biscuits out and lay them on the prepared baking tray. Bake them in the oven for around 8 minutes. They are ready when they are starting to turn golden at the edges (you don't want them to colour too much). Remove from the oven and leave them to cool on the baking tray before transferring them to a wire rack to cool completely.</p> <p>DECORATE THE FIREWORK BISCUITS Prepare a few bowls with different colours of icing. To do this, let your kids mix a few tablespoons of icing sugar with a few drops of water. Add more water or icing as required until you have a smooth paste. Spread one colour of icing over each biscuit. Add a dollop of another colour then use a tooth pick or skewer and drag it through the icing to form a star.</p> 
<p>Forest School</p> 	<p>To make firework sparkler stick.</p> 	<p>Go into the garden and find a good size stick for a sparkler. Can you find some nice natural items too e.g. leaves, ferns etc.</p> <p>Can you now decorate your stick with the natural objects you find? Can you add ribbons and coloured paper to make your very own sparkler. You may need some string or a rubber band to tie the items to your sparkler.</p>

Sensory	To make gloop and create patterns like fire works in the gloop.	<p>Can you make some gloop?</p> <p>You will need: 2 cups of cornflour, 1 cup of water</p> <p>Mix the water into the cornflour. It will take some time to mix together but encourage your child to play with the gloop before it is mixed. What does it feel like? Can you make firework patterns in the gloop?</p>
Please continue to practice the children's independence skills e.g. putting shoes and coats on independently.		

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
